APA Style Guide for Internet & Electronic Resources

The American Psychological Association has published examples of how to cite information in electronic formats in both a print manual and on its association Web site. There is an updated manual for electronic references (released June 2007) called **APA Style Guide to Electronic References**. This manual is intended to replace section 4.16 of the fifth edition of the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (2001, pp. 268-281). The print version of the updated guide is available at Milner Library in the book stacks for checkout and for in building use in the Floor 2 reference collection and behind the Reference Desk (**REF BF171.F56.A63 2007**). A limited online version is located at <http://www.apastyle.org/electmedia.html>.

The updated style guide requires the use of a DOI (**Digital Object Identifier**) for articles instead of a URL or database name if a DOI is available. Also requires that a citation always list the journal issue when it is available regardless of pagination.

WEB SITES

ENTIRE WEB SITE: To acknowledge an entire Web site but not cite a specific page or document found on the site, include the site address within the text of the paper, enclosed in parentheses, rather than at the end of the paper in the reference list.

The U.S. Census Bureau web site is an excellent Internet resource for data on employment in various sectors of the U.S. economy (<http://www.census.gov>).

SPECIFIC PARTS OF A WEB SITE: If a specific part of a web site is used as a resource, the part should be cited in the reference list rather than in the text using the following format:

If an author's name and date are identified on the site—

ELECTRONIC ARTICLE WITH AN ASSIGNED DOI (NOTE: Using a DOI takes the place of the previous APA version that required use of a URL or database name):
